

How Girls Learn "¡Yo Puedo!"

"¡Yo Puedo!" means "I Can!" in Spanish. It's an important phrase.

Young girls in rural Honduras may not always think they can achieve their own dreams. Six of every ten children in these communities leave school by sixth grade. And 15 is the average age at which Honduran women bear their first child.



Through ¡Yo Puedo!, Shoulder to Shoulder holds trainings for fifthand sixth-grade teachers. The teachers then lead self-esteem workshops for their girl students, who learn to design and launch microenterprise projects. These girls quickly discover that they can!

Teachers involved with ¡Yo Puedo! say:

"All the girls are more outgoing and spontaneous in the classroom and in their social interactions outside the classroom since the start of the program. All the girls are less shy now than they were prior to the project. They have shown increased interest in their classes, especially math."

Students in ¡Yo Puedo! say:

¡Yo Puedo! made them more collaborative and showed "they had more capabilities than they thought." With the experience they gained in making and selling piñatas, one entrepreneurial pair said, "We are starting to decide which kinds of piñatas sell the best — the bigger ones, the prettier ones."

¡Yo Puedo! girls need seed funding for their microenterprise projects. The ¡Yo Puedo! program needs curriculum and training support.
